

What is Table Cricket?

Table Cricket is a version of cricket which was developed at Nottingham Trent University. The game was developed to provide a competitive cricket opportunity for young people with a physical disability.

Who can play?

At competition level, teams must consist of a combination of Class 1, 2 and 3 classified players. For team composition and classification see www.ntu.ac.uk/adapted_sports/

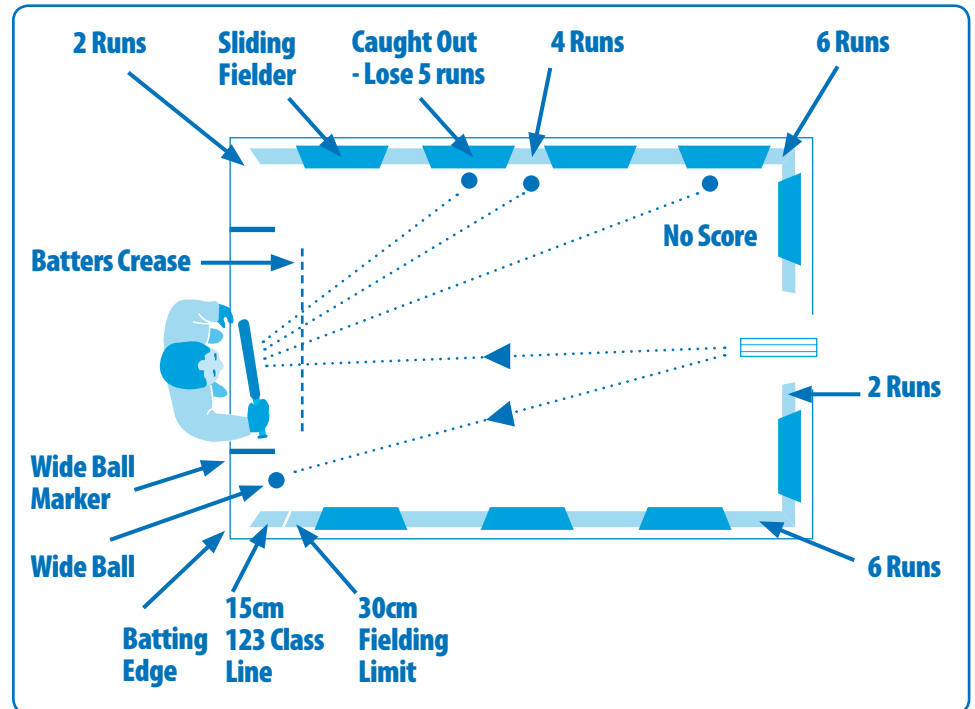
What is the objective of the game?

The objective of the game is to score the most points through batting and fielding.

How is it played?

Field of play	Table Tennis table or a similar surface
Equipment	Side panels, wooden bat and launcher, plastic cricket ball and nine sliding fielders
Players	Each team consists of 6 players and 2 reserves (who can be used from game to game and not during a game)
Length	An innings lasts for two overs, an over consist of 6 bowls

Rules for Table Cricket

Starting

The game starts with a coin toss with the winner determining whether to bat or bowl first.

Batting

- All six players are ranked before a match.
- During an innings the same ranked players from each team must bowl and bat in that pair for one over. At the end handing over to the next pair.

Batter is out if

- Each batter stays in for the full over and is only out if
 1. they hit the ball over the sides off the table,
 2. ball bowled hits any part of the batters fingers, hand, arm or body (LBW)
 3. ball touches part of the caught zone
 4. ball is struck backwards (caught behind)
 5. ball is missed by the batter and goes over the batting end of the table. (out bowled)
 6. the ball is hit and contacts the launcher (caught and bowled)

Runs are scored if:

1. ball is hit in between fielders
2. 4 runs awarded for a wide plus an extra bowl.

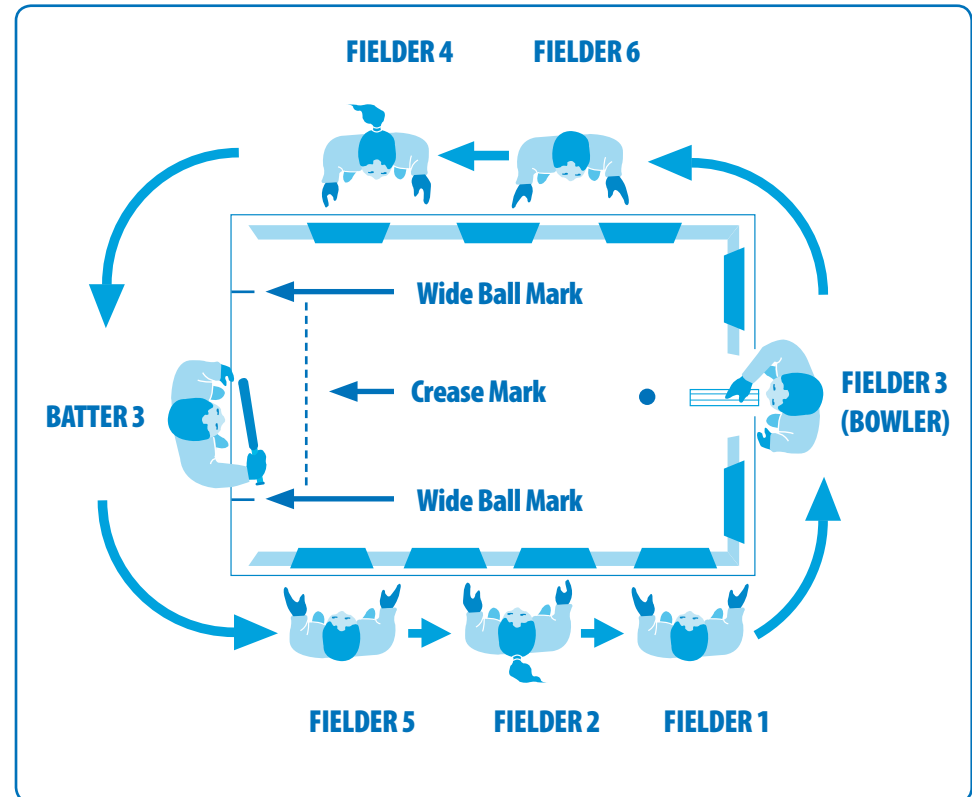
Fielding

- Fielders take their positions around the table according to their ranking.
- Fielders are allowed to change the position of the panel but only before the ball is delivered.
- At the start of each innings one fielder on each side is nominated an 'active fielder' and is able to slide their panel.

Scoring

- Each batting side starts with a total of 200 runs, every time a wicket is lost 5 runs are deducted.
- Team with the most points at the end wins.
